Message From the Chairs

Welcome to the 2025 joint Weed Science Society of America (WSSA) and Canadian Weed Science Society (CWSS) annual meeting at the Sheraton Vancouver Wall Centre in Canada. Our 4-star hotel is located in the heart of Vancouver with English Bay Beach, Stanley Park, and numerous shopping/market venues within a few miles.

Our program may include changes compared to previous meetings, so please read carefully as your arrival and departure date may vary slightly from past events.

Many of our WSSA committee chairs are conducting their meetings virtually prior to the annual meeting thereby eliminating Monday morning committee meetings (WSSA chairs, have your report to President Dahl (gkdahl19@gmail.com) no later than Feb. 17, 2025). CWSS committee chairs, your reports will be presented at your general meeting on Nov. 26, 2024.

We are proud to have Dr. Jennifer Grenz as our Keynote Speaker for our Monday General Session. Our Pre-Conference tour, planned for the morning of Monday, February 24, is a walking tour to Granville Market. On Thursday afternoon (February 27), our Post-Conference events include a bus tour to local craft breweries as well as a harbor boat tour and show. There is also a lot to do on your own if you wish. Make sure to arrange your trip allowing participation for a full day of events on Thursday.

Poster set-up and several committee meetings will be held on Monday afternoon, February 24; Women in Weed Science will meet 2-3:30 pm. The general session and WSSA/CWSS Awards Ceremony will begin at 4:15 pm on Monday, Feb. 24 featuring Dr. Jennifer Grenz, an Indigenous scholar/invasive species expert, and writer. Presidents Greg Dahl (WSSA) and Robert Nurse (CWSS) will collaborate on the presidential address followed by the presentation of our annual awards. A joint reception will follow to celebrate our award winners.

On Tuesday morning at 7 am, a 5K Puff Run/Walk down to the beach and back will take place for exercise enthusiasts. Poster sessions will occur on Tuesday (even numbers) and Wednesday (odd numbers) mornings along with concurrent breakout sessions, contests, and symposia offering scientific data of interest for everyone from Tuesday morning through Thursday at lunch. Tuesday afternoon offers a Graduate Student Workshop on "Exploring Bioinformatics in Weed Science" from 4:30-6 pm. There will be a sponsored reception on Tuesday immediately following the paper sessions. Tuesday evening dining options will include a "Dine-around"; sign up with friends and colleagues to go to a designated restaurant.

As always, our meeting is focused heavily on our students. The Student Lunch and Business meeting be held on Monday from noon to 2 pm. The first hour will be the business meeting and luncheon with the second hour featuring a presentation on "Stand out in the Crowd: Job Search and Interview Strategies". WSSA students will compete Tuesday morning in the SST contest with those making it to the final round speaking again Wednesday morning. For the CWSS contest, students will present Tuesday afternoon. On Wednesday afternoon, WSSA Enrichment Scholarship winners and our two Science Policy fellows will share their experiences. Finally, at approximately 4:45 pm on Wednesday, the presentation and poster contest winners will be recognized followed by a joint WSSA/CWSS celebration.

The Women in Weed Science Networking Event is tentatively scheduled for Monday from 2 to 3:30 PM with all female conference attendees welcome to attend, just sign up when you register.

Keynote Speaker: Jennifer Grenz

Biography

Dr. Jennifer Grenz is an Assistant Professor and Indigenous Scholar (Nlaka'pamux, mixed ancestry) in the Department of Forest Resources Management, jointly appointed between the Faculty of Forestry and Faculty of Land and Food Systems at the University of British Columbia. The research focuses of her Indigenous Ecology Lab are on the application of a food systems lens to restoration ecology and invasion biology, and the relationships between native and invasive plants and soil microbes. The lab works entirely in service to the land-healing research needs of Indigenous communities, particularly in the context of building climate resiliency and major climate event recovery (wildfire). Prior to her academic appointment, Dr. Grenz was the Executive Director of the Invasive Species Council of Metro Vancouver and ran her own invasive plant management company, Greener This Side, managing invasive species for government agencies. Dr. Grenz has just published, "Medicine Wheel for the Planet: A Journey Toward Personal and Ecological Healing", a book based on her PhD dissertation published by Knopf Canada (imprint of Penguin Random House) and the University of Minnesota Press (USA).

Harassment Policy

Statement of Policy

The Weed Science Society of America (WSSA) is dedicated to providing a harassment-free experience for everyone at WSSA events. WSSA seeks to provide a conference environment in which diverse attendees may learn, network and enjoy the company of colleagues in a professional atmosphere. WSSA does not tolerate harassment of attendees in any form. Use of sexual or discriminatory language and imagery is not appropriate for any WSSA event. Violators of this Event Anti-Harassment Policy may be sanctioned or expelled from the event at the discretion of the WSSA event organizers.

Definition of Harassment

Harassment is verbal, written or physical conduct that denigrates or shows hostility or aversion toward an individual because of their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, national origin, age, disability, marital status, citizenship, genetic information, military status or any other characteristic protected by law or that of relatives, friends or associates. Harassing conduct includes but not limited to deliberate intimidation or hostile acts; stalking; following; harassing photography or recording; sustained disruption of talks or other events; and inappropriate physical contact. Attendees asked to stop any harassing behavior are expected to comply immediately.

Definition of Sexual Harassment

Sexual harassment constitutes discrimination and is illegal under federal, state and local laws. Sexual harassment refers to verbal, physical, and visual conduct of a sexual nature that is unwelcome and offensive to the recipient. By way of example, sexual harassment may include such conduct as sexual flirtations, advances, or propositions; verbal comments or physical actions of a sexual nature; sexually degrading words used to describe an individual; an unwelcome display of sexually suggestive objects or pictures; sexually explicit jokes; and offensive, unwanted physical contact such as patting, pinching, grabbing, groping, or constant brushing against another's body. Attendees asked to stop any sexually harassing behavior are expected to comply immediately.

Scope of Policy

This Anti-Harassment Policy applies to all attendees at WSSA events, including participants, guests, staff, contractors, and exhibitors. All attendees are expected to comply with this Event Anti-Harassment Policy at all event venues and event-related social events.

Reporting an Incident

If you are being harassed, notice that someone else is being harassed, or have any other concerns, please contact an WSSA staff member immediately. WSSA staff can be identified by the official staff badge which is white with the blue and green WSSA logo, their name and title. All complaints will be treated seriously and will be investigated promptly. WSSA staff will be happy to help attendees contact venue security or local law enforcement, provide escorts, or otherwise assist those experiencing harassment to feel safe for the duration of the event. Additional information on reporting an incident at a specific event can be found below.

Disciplinary Action

All reports of harassment will be directed immediately to the WSSA's Conference leadership team who may consult with and engage other WSSA staff, leaders and legal counsel as appropriate. Event security and/or local law enforcement may be involved, as appropriate based on the specific circumstances. In response to a report of harassment, the WSSA Conference leadership team or WSSA staff may take any action they deem appropriate. Such actions range from a verbal warning to ejection from the event without a refund. Repeat offenders may be subject to further disciplinary action, such as being banned from participating in future WSSA conferences or events.

Reporting Procedure

Individuals who believe they have been the victims of conduct prohibited by this policy or believe they have witnessed such conduct should discuss their concerns with Eric Gustafson, WSSA Executive, any WSSA staff, or any member of the WSSA Executive Committee, concerns can be transmitted electronically via info@wssa.net. Weed Science Society of America encourages the prompt reporting of complaints or concerns so that rapid and constructive action can be taken before relationships become irreparably strained. Therefore, while no fixed reporting period has been established, early reporting and intervention have proven to be the most effective method of resolving actual or perceived incidents of harassment.

- Research, product development, sales, and marketing with companies specializing in weed management in croplands, aquatic habitats, parks, and urban areas

To prepare for a career in weed science, you typically need a bachelor's degree in agronomy, biochemistry, biology, chemistry, ecology, horticulture, plant physiology, soil science, or a related field. For a research position in academia or industry, an advanced degree is required.
